Readings for 5th April Palm Sunday

Collect

Almighty and everlasting God, who in your tender love towards the human race sent your Son our Saviour Jesus Christ to take upon him our flesh and to suffer death upon the cross: grant that we may follow the example of his patience and humility, and also be made partakers of his resurrection; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**

On Palm Sunday, at the start of the service, the Church traditionally hears the story of Jesus riding into Jerusalem on a donkey – a humble king. The palm crosses are blessed, and sometimes there is a palm procession. The people broke branches from the palm trees to wave, because they were the local trees. Don't break branches, but maybe there's a fallen branch, or you could make a palm leaf (if all else fails, draw round your hand, cut it out, colour it green, sellotape it to the end of a stick or straw). Sing 'hosanna' – praise to Jesus our king.

Gospel of the Palms: Matt 21: 1-11

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, "The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately.' This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, 'Tell the daughter of Zion,

Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

'Hosanna to the Son of David!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

Hosanna in the highest heaven!'

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, 'Who is this?' The crowds were saying, 'This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee.'

The other readings and the Psalm move us from Palm Sunday to Good Friday. We hear the whole of the story of Jesus' last 24 hours in the Gospel reading.

I've just put the Bible reference this week, as the readings are long. If you haven't got a Bible at home, let me know and I'll send you the full version of the readings.

Old Testament reading Isaiah 50: 4-9a

Verses from Psalm 31 (9-16)

My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?

New Testament reading Philippians 2: 5-11

Gospel reading Matthew 26: 14- end of 27

Prayer during the week

True and humble king, hailed by the crowd as Messiah: grant us the faith to know you and love you, that we may be found beside you on the way of the cross, which is the path of glory. **Amen**
